Historically, counsellors have been involved in the restoration of normal, or at least improved; functioning in people who have a relative deficit of some kind, while coaches have been more focused on raising the performance of normal or even high functioning individuals to achieve the individual's full potential. In recent years, the coaching industry has grown to encompass a large proportion of the remedial work traditionally done by counsellors (particularly in the health coaching arena), and the line between these two professional groups has blurred considerably. Traditionally, coaching has had a strong emphasis on client strengths and client empowerment. This approach has also been progressively adopted as a fundamental platform of counselling. There is now a vast array of jobs across the business, health and human services areas, as well as private practices, that require staff to regularly undertake coaching and/or counselling of individuals and groups.

Alternative pathways

Deakin's postgraduate courses in coaching and counselling offer a pathway for students to develop the knowledge, skills and experience that is applicable to any career where working with individuals and groups for behaviour change is a focus. These courses also offer an alternative career pathway from the Australian Psychology Accreditation Council (APAC) approved fourth-year programs, for students who have an undergraduate major sequence in psychology.

The graduate certificate and graduate diploma courses offer advanced knowledge and practical skill-based learning to enable graduates to gain meaningful employment in a broad range of rewarding fields, without the necessity of pursuing further study at masters or doctorate level.

Course duration and location

The Graduate Certificate of Coaching and Counselling can be completed in one year of part-time study, while the graduate diploma can be completed in two years of part-time study. Both courses are offered on the Melbourne Burwood Campus.

Accreditation and professional recognition

The course curriculum is aligned and likely to fulfil the accreditation requirements of a number of accrediting bodies such as the International Coaching Association (ICA) and the Psychotherapy and Counselling Federation of Australia (PACFA), and accreditation for these courses will be sought when the first cohort of students graduate at the end of 2013 and 2014 respectively. Subject to accreditation, graduates will be eligible to apply for registration and membership of the relevant associations.

Practical placement program

The Graduate Diploma of Coaching and Counselling offers a practical placement unit in the final year of the program. These placements provide you with the opportunity to further develop and apply practical skills and experience in supported professional settings, and in metropolitan, rural and regional areas.

The skills and experience acquired throughout your studies will enable you to practise confidently as a coach and/or counsellor upon entering the workforce and will make you highly employable across an array of stimulating employment settings throughout Australia and internationally.

Credit for Prior Learning

The University aims to provide students with as much credit as possible for approved prior study or informal learning which exceeds the normal entrance requirements for the course and is within the constraints of the course regulations. Students are required to complete a minimum of one-third of the course at Deakin University, or four credit points, whichever is the greater. In the case of certificates, including graduate certificates, a minimum of two credit points within the course must be completed at Deakin. In all cases, Credit for Prior Learning will be determined on a case-by-case basis. Please contact Health – Student and Academic Services for more information about Credit for Prior Learning and how to apply.

Application details

Admission requirements: The minimum requirements are successful completion of a three-year undergraduate degree, or equivalent, from an approved university or other educational institution or successful completion of other equivalent qualifications gained by examination. The criteria for admission are normally based on academic merit as indicated by an applicant's previous academic record.
