World-shaping research

Deakin is renowned for world-class research in health and wellbeing. This directly informs the design of our undergraduate and postgraduate programs, which means you graduate with the most current knowledge in psychology. Our research groups collaborate with organisations across a wide range of sectors, including government, health services, business and community organisations. This allows us to ensure that our research impacts and reaches those who will benefit most.

Our innovative research groups include:

The Centre for Social and Early Emotional Development (SEED Lifespan) researches the developmental origins of mental health and disorders. SEED brings together life course research, clinical and public health research, and practice to describe the major milestones in emotional life, and advise on the most effective early interventions.

The Mind-Body Research in Health Laboratory specialises in health and clinical psychology as well as behavioural medicine. This research group studies the way that the mind and body interact in a variety of contexts. Researchers are developing developing supportive therapies for debilitating chronic conditions such as inflammatory bowel disease, endometriosis and cancer.

The Centre for Drug use, Alcohol and Addictive Behaviour Research (CEDAAR) conducts research into the epidemiological, psychological, social and clinical aspects of addictive behaviours, with a view to reduce harm through best-practice approaches to prevention, policy and treatment.

The Cognitive Neuroscience Unit expands our understanding of neuroscience by using brain stimulation, neurophysiological and neuroimaging techniques to explore the relationship between cognition, behaviour and biology.

Pathways to general registration as a psychologist

To gain provisional registration as a psychologist, you need to complete four years of academic study in psychology that is recognised by the Psychology Board of Australia (PsyBA). This usually consists of an approved psychology sequence (e.g. Bachelor of Psychological Science or Graduate Diploma of Psychological Science), followed by an approved fourth year of study, such as Deakin's Graduate Diploma of Psychology (Advanced) or an honours year in psychology. You can then apply for provisional registration with PsyBA.

To gain general registration, you must then complete a minimum two years of further postgraduate study, such as a Master of Psychology (Clinical), Master of Psychology (Organisational), Master of Professional Psychology (one year course plus one year of training), or Doctor of Psychology (Clinical). It's at this stage that you can specialise, following further supervision and training, in a particular area of psychology that appeals to your interests and career aspirations.


Pathways to becoming a counsellor

If counselling is your passion, Deakin offers three postgraduate degrees to support this pathway.

- Graduate Certificate of Counselling
- · Graduate Diploma of Counselling
- · Master of Counselling

Our Graduate Diploma of Counselling and Master of Counselling are both accredited by the Australian Counselling Association (ACA). Our Master of Counselling is also accredited by the Psychotherapy and Counselling Federation of Australia (PACFA).

These industry recognised accreditations enhance your career prospects, build professional credibility, and connect you to valuable professional development and networking opportunities, setting you up for a successful counselling career.

Where can a psychology degree take me?

A psychology qualification can prepare you for many diverse and exciting career paths. While some psychology graduates go on to become registered psychologists, many others will pursue roles in complementary professions or entirely different fields. Careers in psychology-related fields are always evolving; there are plenty of opportunities to tailor your studies aimed towards specific areas you're interested in – including some you may not have considered.

Community

Community development professional

Community development professionals help develop safe, active communities that are socially, economically and environmentally healthy. In this field, you'll work with local communities to plan for present and future needs, with a particular focus on people in disadvantaged communities.

Community support worker (mental health)

Community support workers provide support and assistance to members of the community in a range of areas, one of the largest of these being mental health. They provide high-quality support services to help people in their own homes, boarding houses/hostels and within the community. Their focus is on strengthening networks and empowering individuals to advance their own interests, and personal and social skills.

Education and training (trainer/facilitator)

Working in schools as a teacher or psychologist requires formal qualifications and registration. If you're interested in working with children or adolescents, there are other areas you may like to look into, including childcare or supporting students with special needs in the classroom. Working as a trainer or facilitator is another option. Trainers and facilitators design and deliver programs as well as assess learning outcomes. Trainers and facilitators work in a number of areas across the community and other sectors.

There's a huge range of employers in this area, which include private, government and community organisations. Possible employers might include:

Government, policy and research

Policy

If you have an understanding of the issues facing a certain sector, a role in policy could be for you. You'll advise governments or organisations on policy development and act as an advocate for the relevant sector.

Social research

As a social researcher, you'll design and implement research projects with the goal of improving outcomes for the community. Social research is generally academic, and has a long-term goal of benefiting the community. Some positions require applicants to have an honours degree in psychology; others require a minimum of an undergraduate degree in psychology or a relevant field.

Employers in government, policy and research

Employers in this area vary widely, but could include government departments, local councils and also the private sector. Possible employers might include:

Children and families

Children and family support worker

Child and family support workers help children, young people, families and those facing hardship or disadvantage. They provide support, information, advocacy, case management and activity-based programs for those in at-risk situations, in need of education or financial support and people who need help with parenting or early childhood issues.

Youth worker

Youth services and programs are widespread and varied across a range of sectors, including education, health, mental health, housing, family and children's services, substance abuse, justice, and sport and recreation. However, they all address the needs of youth – particularly those who are vulnerable or at risk.


Domestic/family violence worker

There's a range of services designed to help those experiencing domestic/family violence – primarily for women and children. Services might include telephone counselling, referral to services such as emergency accommodation or crisis counselling, supporting women and children to remain at home or find temporary shelter, and advocacy for support services, the police and the criminal justice systems.

Employers in children and families

Employers in this area are typically not-for-profit, government or community-based organisations. Examples include:

Coaching and counselling

Career counselling

Career counsellors help students choose career paths that align with their interests and strengths and build the skills they need for a successful working life.

Rehabilitation counselling (accident/injury)

Your role as a rehabilitation counsellor will involve helping clients with severe injuries return to optimal health by developing holistic individualised plans, identifying barriers to return to health and/or return to work and implementing strategies to overcome these.

Telephone/digital counselling

Connecting with your clients by phone, you'll provide support for a range of psychological and personal challenges, including grief/trauma, depression/mental illness, alcohol and substance abuse, gambling/financial support, child protection and more. You may also provide telephone counselling in crisis situations.

Employers in coaching and counselling

Employers in this area vary widely, but could include government departments, local councils and the private sector. Possible employers might include:

Where can a psychology degree take me?

Health and human services and social work

Health and human services consulting

Working closely with government and not-for-profit clients, you'll use your passion for social policy to manage and administer projects.

Aged care worker

Aged care is a large and expanding sector. People who work in this area support elderly members of the community to live in a variety of settings, including their own homes, retirement villages, hostels, nursing homes or crisis housing. They often deal with age-related issues such as disability, illness, Alzheimer's disease and depression/isolation.

Disability support worker

Support services for people with disabilities (both physical and intellectual) operate in a range of areas, including employment, accommodation, life skills and respite. Disability support workers promote, facilitate and advocate for the rights and interests of people living with disabilities.

Drug and alcohol workers

Drug and alcohol workers provide assessment, support and intervention to clients with alcohol and drug issues, and implement health promotion and community intervention programs.

Employers in health and human services and social work

Employers in this area are typically not-for-profit organisations, community-based agencies, local government or professional services firms that offer consulting. Examples include:

Justice system

Conciliator

Conciliators help the parties of a dispute reach agreement. You'll use your understanding of human behaviour to identify and address conflict by conducting investigations, formulating reports and proposing recommendations. You will need to communicate effectively on complex matters with a wide range of people.

Youth justice

The youth justice program works with young offenders aged between 10 and 20 years who will generally be on a children's court order, or in some cases, an adult court order. Youth justice workers also engage young people in positive change, providing care, supervision and support to develop practical and interpersonal skills.

Community corrections

Community Corrections Officers (CCOs) monitor and supervise offenders who have been sentenced by the courts to serve Community Correctional Orders or who have been released from prison on parole by the Adult Parole Board.

Prison officer

Prison officers are responsible for the management and secure containment of prisoners throughout Australia. Corrections Victoria adopts a case-management approach, where prison officers with direct prisoner supervision are assigned a prisoner caseload.

Child protection worker

Child protection practitioners are responsible for ensuring the safety and wellbeing of children and young people and can involve working with infants, adolescents, Indigenous children and families, as well as culturally and linguistically diverse populations.

Employers in the justice system

These roles fall across multiple government departments and organisations. Possible employers might include:

- Consumer Affairs Victoria
- Department of Justice and Community Safety
- Fair Work Commission
- Victorian Equal Opportunity and Human Rights Commission.

Human resources and marketing

Recruitment consultant

Recruitment is one of the largest areas within human resources. You'll be responsible for aiming to hire outstanding talent for your organisation. That means managing the recruitment process from the outset – compiling job requirements, hosting interviews and selecting the best suited candidate.

Occupational health and safety

Occupational health and safety (OH&S) involves many different areas of work, which include injury management and workers compensation.

Organisational development

Organisational development refers to the planned development, improvement and reinforcement of strategies, structures and processes that make an organisation effective. Organisational development roles largely revolve around change management and can often involve the training, mentoring, coaching and development of staff within an organisation.

Market research and analysis

Market research and analysis revolves around the ability to understand consumer behaviour. Your solid grounding in psychology will help your employer understand why people think, feel and purchase the way they do. Some people in this field focus on sales and interpreting and presenting data, while others are responsible for research, training or consumer advocacy.

Advertising

Advertising agencies can be located within or independent of an organisation with a marketing department. They can be in the form of two or three people in a small creative agency, to hundreds of employees at a global agency or company. People who work in this area are generally known as brand, product or marketing managers. They're involved in researching target audiences for products and services and developing advertising and promotional materials based on this research.

Employers in human resources and marketing

There are many employers in this area, both in the public and private sectors. Possible employers might include:

Nurse or midwife

Nursing and teaching

Nurses and midwives provide high-quality, patient-centred care in a range of settings and often draw on their in-depth knowledge of the complexity of human personality and behaviour.

Teacher


Teachers draw on their in-depth knowledge of behaviour, including why and how people learn the way they do, to tailor learning approaches to the individual.

Carpers

Following the completion of your bachelor degree, taking the next step towards becoming a psychologist involves applying for an approved fourth year of study in psychology, e.g. Deakin's Bachelor of Psychological Science (Honours) or the Graduate Diploma of Psychology (Advanced). Once completed, you'll be able to gain provisional registration as a psychologist with PsyBA and be eligible to pursue further study in pursuit of general registration.

If your intention isn't to complete further study to become a registered psychologist, there are still many diverse career options available, including child protection, counselling, family support, health and human services, marketing, not-for-profit aid, and public health.

If you choose to pursue general registration as a psychologist, you may find employment in a variety of roles (some of which will require additional specialist training), including:

- · clinical psychologist
- · cognitive neuroscientist
- counsellor
- criminal psychologist
- educational and developmental psychologist
- · family therapist
- forensic psychologist
- health and community psychologist
- organisational psychologist

Psychological science major




